My first sponsor told me the principle for Step Twelve is responsibility. This means that I am now able to respond to my abilities and be responsible for them." She said, "Step Twelve tells us that we try to carry this message to alcoholics and practice these principles in all our affairs. You now have the ability to carry the message of sobriety to the next suffering alcoholic and you are now responsible for practicing these principles in all of your affairs. You have to give it away in order to keep it."

The first time I heard that statement I was newly sober and I thought to my self and may have even said it aloud to someone, "I'm not giving anything away to anyone. I'm keeping what little sanity and sobriety I have to myself." I had no idea what it really meant or how much helping another suffering alcoholic would mean to me and my sobriety. But as time went on and I continued to work these steps, learn about the principles and develop an understanding of how they needed to be applied in my life, I began to realize just what an amazing and priceless gift I had been given by my Higher Power, the Program of Alcoholics Anonymous and the fellowship of those who were willing to help me selflessly. I wanted to be of service to my Higher Power and to others.

Helping another alcoholic has saved my sobriety when nothing else worked. The Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous tells me that intensive work with others insures my immunity from alcohol. That is a very small price for such an unlimited amount of love, gratitude and gifts that I receive throughout life.

It is a great honor and privilege to have someone ask me to help them learn how to stay sober and have a life second to none. Before AA, no one wanted ANYTHING I had to offer or possessed. I was a liar, a cheat, a thief, manipulator of feelings, hostage taker and assassinator of others' character because mine was so pitifully incomprehensible.

These Steps and Principles have changed not only my life, but the lives of millions who desire a new way of living. It is much easier to give and demand nothing in return today, especially the gift of sobriety. I try to do my best to help others when they reach their hand and ask.

As for having a spiritual awakening, for me that comes in every day living. I have experienced life on life's terms in my sobriety. Some of those experiences have brought great joy and others have brought great pain and suffering. My Higher Power has brought me through both and it gives me the awareness of my spirit awakening more to his grace and love.

This is the Season of giving and I can't think of a better gift I have received that the gift of sobriety, a gift that has no boundaries. And I can't think of a better gift to give my family, friends and Higher Power than my perseverance to continue to stay sober.

## **\$TEP TWELVE** (Recovery)

"Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs."

PRINCIPLE: Responsibility— moral, legal, or mental accountability

Service—contribution to the welfare of others

The joy of living is the theme of A.A.'s Twelfth Step, and action is its key word. Here we turn outward toward our fellow alcoholics who are still in distress. Here we experience the kind of giving that asks no rewards. Here we begin to practice all Twelve Steps of the program in our daily lives so that we and those about us may find emotional sobriety. When the twelfth Step is seen its full implication, it is really talking about the kind of love that has no price tag on it.

For it is only by accepting and solving our problems that we can begin to get right with ourselves and with the world about us, and with Him who presides over us all. Understanding is the key to right principles and attitudes, and right action is the key to good living: therefore the joy of good living is the theme of A.A.'s Twelfth Step.

## **TRADITION TWELVE** (Unity)

"Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our principles reminding us to place principles before personalities."

The spiritual substance of anonymity is sacrifice.

Let us always remember that anonymity—not taking credit for our own or others' recovery is humility at work.

Sacrificing personal ambition for the common good.

Our principles come first — and they are not our own invention. They reflect eternal spiritual values. With this Tradition, both as individuals and as a fellowship, we humbly acknowledge our dependence on a power higher than ourselves.

## **CONCEPT TWELVE** (Service)

General Warranties of the Conference: in all its proceedings, the General Service Conference shall observe the spirit of the A.A. Tradition, taking great care that the conference never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds, plus an ample reserve, be its prudent financial principle; that none of the Conference Members shall ever be placed in a position of unqualified authority over any of the others; that all important decisions be reached by discussion vote and whenever possible, by substantial unanimity; that no Conference action ever be personally punitive or an incitement to public controversy; that though the Conference may act for the service of Alcoholics Anonymous, it shall never perform any acts of government; and that, like the Society of Alcoholics Anonymous which it serves, the Conference itself will always remain democratic in thought and action

#### STEP BY STEP

## Practice the Principle—June 1981

Around the tables, when we talk about the Twelfth Step, more often than not it is in the terms of twelfth stepping—that is, helping newcomers to AA. Naturally, some attention is focused on the other aspects of the Step, namely, the spiritual awakening and the practice of AA principle in our affairs. But do we go into those aspects as deeply as we should or could?

I have recently been receiving a number of pointed reminders about the practice of principles. It is easy to practice principles at AA meetings and in meditation times at home; but once out the door, it is another matter.

I must admit also that I sometimes stumble about the principles right at an AA meeting. As a matter of fact, even in the quiet times, early in the morning, I can catch myself reflecting on someone else's defects and shortcomings. Fortunately, as sobriety lengthens and more meetings are attended, I am getting better—just as promised if I didn't take that first drink.

Each morning now, often during the day, I ask for help in me efforts to make the quiet meditation times a basis for practicing AA principles in all my affairs that day. Simply asking for help seems to be a help in itself; with this seeking, life becomes more beautiful and exciting. They may not realize yet that I am trying to practice AA principles in all my affairs, but I know I am trying. Most important, I realize I need help to do so. That means I am coming to grips with my ego. When I do, I go out the door—and find people much easier to deal with.

About a year ago, I was able to begin some Twelfth-Step work in a local jail. I think my underlying motive was survivor's guilt; I just hadn't got caught. As I began the work, I realized I had a prejudice that the ladies there had a different, more severer type of alcoholism than I suffered from. There was also a tendency on my part to include the spicier parts of my story.

Boy, was I wrong!! It truly is the case that these women are "serving my sentence." The folks in these facilities have the same type of alcoholism that I have. I have noticed notice that other women who have come in to tell their stories have had similar responses. And on the way out, they realize that it was luck of the draw, not superior intelligence, that separates the alcoholic inside the walls front those outside.

This service has helped me stay sober more that I thought it would, as well as offering the joy of giving it away. It has certainly altered the inside job my Higher Power has done for me. It also brings home that when we take the first drink, the world can do to us as it sees fit. Our freedom to choose is gone.

#### WHY DOES YOUR GROUP NEED AN IRCO DELEGATE?


